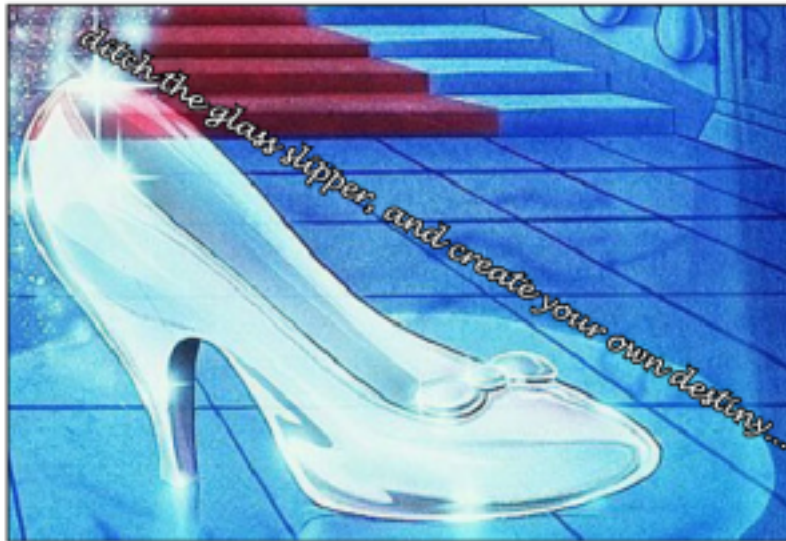


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This is reality, not a fairytale; so go after your dreams.
